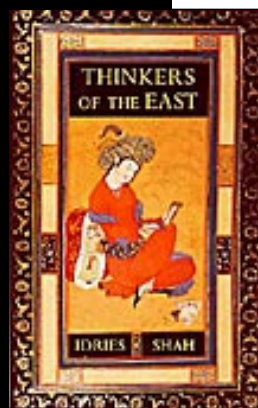

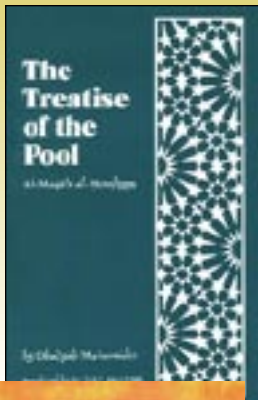

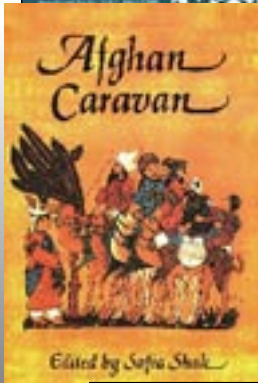
Treatise of the Pool (Al-Mawala al-Hawdiyya)

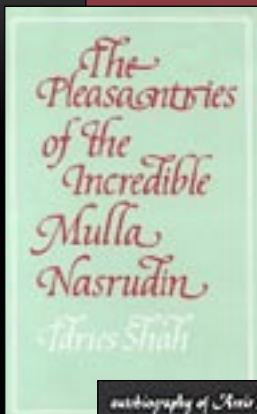


The Quatrains of Khalilullah Khalili,

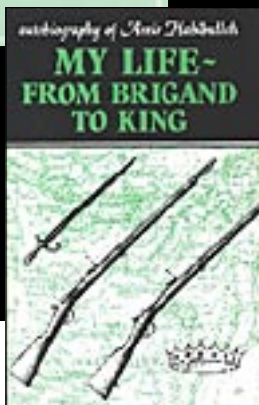
The Pleasantries of the Incredible Mulla Nasrudin
